HOUSELIGHTS latest production, JAB, proved to be a real hit with audiences this term.

The play charts the tale of a young female boxer, Maxine, who is tipped to become a member of Team GB's boxing squad, until an unexplained seizure leaves her stranded in the ring.

Student Director, Lilly Howse, said 'This is our second devised piece with the HOUSE-LIGHTS ensemble and I think it is possibly our best performance yet. It's also been our most personal. We knew we wanted to do something about a female boxer but it wasn't until we were several weeks into rehearsals that the idea emerged.'

The HOUSELIGHTS team went through a series of physical theatre workshops to generate ideas for the show and by Christmas a full script had been written based on some of the ideas that came out of the process.

Head of Drama, Mr Smith, said 'I'm really pleased with the story we've managed to pull together - it is an emotional rollercoaster, and it touches on the frustration of awaiting a diagnosis. The story could have easily become flat, but the HOUSELIGHTS ensemble had so much energy and focus that they've really produced something magical.

'Our ensemble have been phenomenal. Despite everything going on around them they have really raised the bar again this year. I couldn't be prouder of what they have produced and how hard they have worked. From our cast of actors to other students working behind the scenes making costumes, stage-managing, composing original music, operating the sound and lights or as part of our directorial team, it's been awesome.'



This year's production saw several new arrivals to the HOUSELIGHTS ensemble, including Mabel Walton who played the lead role, Maxine.

Mabel said 'This is the first show I've been able to take part in since before COVID-19. I'd seen my sister involved with HOUSELIGHTS over the last two years and it was one of the main reasons I decided to join Chatham & Clarendon's sixth form.

Mabel continues, 'It's a really intense show with so many physical sequences to learn and remember and I'm on stage for virtually the whole thing apart from a few quick costume changes. It was really challenging but I'm so glad to have been a part of it.'

JAB was the third HOUSELIGHTS production for Maddy Sales, who plays Maxine's close friend and sparring partner Casey.

Maddy said 'I think this is without doubt the best HOUSELIGHTS production I've been involved with. The Frantic Assembly style sequences were so much fun to be a part of and develop and by the end of the run I was literally going through the sequences and lines in my sleep.'

Mr Smith finished by saying 'There's such a special atmosphere at this school built on compassion, trust and respect, which has filtered from the Headteacher down. My colleague Mrs Cackett and I took a chance and set HOUSELIGHTS up three years ago because we knew we had the full support of the School Leadership Team. It makes such a difference knowing you can take risks and that there are people behind you willing for it to succeed or to pick you up if you fail. It's something we try to instil in our students, and we are seeing them grow more confident and ambitious year on year.

'It's unique. I've never known another school to have such a sense of community and to champion the creative arts as much as they do here at Chatham & Clarendon. The success of JAB is no coincidence. Our students have grown so much since the pandemic and it's so nice to finally see them reach their potential again.'

The MFL department has been busy in the last few weeks!

Students from Y9 to Y13 have been taking part in a variety of educational visits which has given them numerous opportunities to see the concrete application of learning French and Spanish.

Y9 were invited to attend a day of workshops at the British Film Institute in London, Southbank. This gave them a chance to watch award-winning short films, in the target language, and to learn and use key vocab to talk about the situations or the cinematographic techniques used in the making of those films. We were impressed with the behaviour and focus of the groups who attended. Some were very brave to volunteer to answer questions in front of an audience of around 400 teenagers and teachers. An even braver pair performed a scene on stage and in French!!!

Y12 had the opportunity to go to the University of Kent to attend a day of conferences. To quote the organisers: "Organised by the Langton Language Centre in collaboration with the University of Kent, this day conference included lectures and workshops in French, German and Spanish relating to the current A level syllabus and aimed at improving language skills and cultural understanding. There were also contributions from university staff and support from university students." The day proved very valuable, and our students realised that there is a life for languages outside the classroom! It gave them perspective on potential use of languages in their future careers too.

groups this year allowed us to organise a short trip over the waters to experience first hand some of the themes on the French syllabus. 15 Y12 and Y13 students took the ferry to France on a chilly (yet thankfully wind free) January morning. One big part of the Y13 work is dedicated to the study of life in occupied France so we paid a visit to "La Coupole" near St Omer. The scale of the site gave us an idea of the nazi military operation in Northern France and beyond. The most prominent feature was a huge concrete dome, constructed in the side of a chalk quarry. The facility was designed to be a V2 launch pad which, had it been successfully completed, would have allowed the Germans to bomb Southeast England and London, without leaving French soil.

Our visit left a lasting impression on our pupils who gained a better understanding of how hard life must have been for the French population under the nazi regime. The rest of our trip was spent discovering the northern city of Lille, its history, architecture, and gastronomy. And of course, a bit of retail therapy "à la française" in the "Euralille" shopping centre as well as in Lille town centre made the experience all the more worth it! On the way

home, we even got a snapshot of the French farmers strikes when our coach had to leave the motorway which was blocked by an impressive number of tractors and a few piles of France's best manure! Weirdly enough, this was like seeing the curriculum in action as one of the Y12 topics looks at the world of work (and consequently strikes) in modern France.

Finally, the Y13 Spanish A Level group went to the Cervantes Theatre in London to see a performance of the play they are studying: La Casa de Bernarda Alba. This striking play by the Spanish dramatist Federico García Lorca, performed by a cast of 8 women, tells us about the living conditions for women in early 20th century Spain. The Cervantes Theatre's intimate setting makes you feel like you are on stage with the women, experiencing their plights and struggles. This trip always brings the play to life and adds an all-important dimension to its study.

All of these visits were greatly enjoyed by pupils and staff alike and, in a post-covid world, have reminded us of how travelling is paramount to the development of curiosity and cultural awareness in our students' young minds.

Medical Research Council Facility Trip, Oxford

On 23rd February, 15 6th formers were invited to the MRC facility for the day to experience life in research laboratories and to visit the Mary Lyon Centre.

Students were given a tour of the laboratories and were able to see processes like gene 'knock in' and 'knock out' and genetically modified stem cell use in action. Yr13s are currently studying gene technology and were able to see PCR machinery for real and appreciate the high throughput achieved by automation. This technology revolutionised the human genome project and took years off the estimated completion date. A working lunch looked at how behaviour video and recognition software were revolutionising disease detection. The concept is that e.g. in Parkinsons, much earlier detection through subtle behavioural changes could create a window to apply early therapies to delay more serious symptoms and disease progression. Visiting the Mary Lyon Centre required specialist clean clothing and adopting practises so that we did not contaminate the area. The air shower was a unique experience!

"It was a pleasure to have visited the Mary Lyon Centre at MRC Harwell. With the technology required to perform processes like phenotyping and genotyping, it was astonishing and it truly

demonstrated how genetics have a role in an organisms development. For instance, looking at the machinery and technology that was used to show how genes can be put together in order to achieve a specific characteristic. Additionally, the technology involved in PCR testing which was crucial to our fight against COVID-19 and its use for biometric identification when trying to identify criminals for example was incredibly fascinating. This visit has truly inspired me into the world of medical research. "

"Currently studying the topics of DNA, genes, chromosomes and genetic diversity in Year 12- It was fascinating to see first-hand the future of genetic research for the use of studying human diseases and not only apply my growing knowledge to the activities provided but also stretch my current understanding to a more advanced level. Apart from the air showers and welcoming muffins on our arrival, my favourite part of the day would have to be seeing the germ-free mice at the facility that are currently being used to study the effects of microbiota in living organisms. But of course, at the end of the day also hearing about who the centre was named after in recognition of her achievements - Mary Lyon. It was inspirational to learn of the history of her academic strides during a time of inequality for women in the world of science. Despite these challenges, Mary went on to study Physiology, Zoology and Biochemistry at Girton College, Cambridge and became one of the foremost geneticists of the 20th century. Our visit to the Mary Lyon Centre at MRC Harwell was truly a privilege and an invaluable opportunity. I'd like to give my thanks to all involved with the day for giving up their time and efforts to make our experience the best it could be."







Computer Science - BEBRAS and Oxford University Competition

All year 10 and 11 computer science students entered the BEBRAS Computational Thinking challenge. This is a UK national competition. Students compete in problem solving and how solutions can be arrived at using a range of techniques we teach in computer science.
