A very big thank you to all our students, whose jumpers have brightened up our day and for the generous donations to the foodbank, we managed to fill an office with our donations!












It's Panto Time again! Oh yes, it is......

ACTIONS SPEAK LOUDER THAN WORDS

What a great day Miss Burke, Mr Such and myself, Mrs Myhill, had again, judging the House Drama. It's always so encouraging to see all the years taking part, and this year, in particular, we had lots of year 7s. We enjoyed all the plays, and the decisions were hard to make.

Unfortunately, there was one recurring problem this year; lack of projection. We lost hearing so many lines from a number of the cast members, sometimes making their plays much harder to comprehend!

First up was RP, Revolution in the Classroom. Written and directed by Daniel Young, Ruby Tipple and Luke Gore, this had some extremely funny moments in it, but meandered a little too much, and definitely suffered from some too-quiet line delivery. This was such a shame as the production had so much to commend it, and I was unsuccessfully (and silently) willing people to speak up! Some of the cast, however, were great (notably Maddie Bowes), and there looks to be much upcoming talent amongst the (uncredited on the programme) younger cast members.

MS performed next, with a much simpler, linear idea. And because it was such a clear plot, the fewer soft lines weren't as crucial! The whole play aptly encapsulated the theme, and Rachel de la Barra Stone's central skipping performance was delightful.

KH's play was much too short, and there was such good opportunity for expanding some of their scenes... We particularly enjoyed the too-brief Shakespeare tableaux. Theirs was entitled "We're doing a sequel" and had a good overall premise, though it didn't fit the theme quite as well as

MS's. It was great to see so many year 7s taking part, and their lead, Rosie Rapone-Ducker was one such who really showed potential.

TS, who won overall last year, were last to perform, and did not disappoint. From the strong opening of their "Words Left Unspoken" onwards, they entertained us, made the most of the given theme, and had some particularly strong performances. Apollo Stocker, as usual! commanded the stage, and showed a tender maturity in her on-stage relationship with Emily Field's character. Ruben Lanciaprima once again shone in his comic role as the creepy Anthony, but year 7, Ewan Patterson, also revealed a masterly gift in comedy, timing, and understanding. Some of the actors here could also afford to project better, but the flow was never lost, and we understood the entire plot. The café scenes were particularly well handled, including the slick moving of the furniture.
